## Making Oregon the Safest Place in the US for Pets

#### **Behavior & Rescue Center**

- Since opening (10mths) 57 dogs and 67 cats have been through the BMod program = 124
   (# dogs + cats through the BMod program 2022 = 85)
- 49 dogs and 54 cats have been adopted = 103
   (# adopted in 2022 = 70)
- Pets are moving through the program approx. 40% faster.



#### Behavior & Rescue Center

- Design open, spacious, natural light
- Apartments, real life rooms, flex spaces
- Side-side dog kennels / only 3 in a row.
- Tall cat kennels with a window in each
- Close location of yards and training rooms
- Central shared commissary / laundry
- Two separate pods in Rescue Center/ flexible for different species





#### **OHS HUMANE LAW ENFORCEMENT**

- Humane special agents are commissioned by the Superintendent of Oregon State Police to enforce Oregon's animal welfare laws
- Statewide authority; focused enforcement in the Willamette Valley
- Special agents are DPSST certified peace officers and maintain the same training
- Authority to request search warrants, arrest suspects, cite and release
- Additional authority compared to animal control





### OHS received more than 3,600 animal welfare reports in 2022.








## OHS Animal Crimes Forensic Center


- Opened in November 2022
- Only second center of its kind in U.S. Another forensic center located in Florida
- Three veterinarians can perform forensic exams, provide detailed reports, testify their findings in court
- Forensic services provided to all law enforcement in Oregon/SW Washington
- 1st necropsy in new ACFC was from Salem PD neglect/abandonment case – 10 cats total; 2 deceased
- Open through Oct 2023: 55 cases, 83 forensic services performed, 20 outside agencies assisted






# Why Build the Community Veterinary Hospital?

- Keep pets with families
- Reduce unnecessary euthanasia in community
- Reduce requests for medical/behavioral intake
- Expand HVHQSN services
- Provide subsidized care
- Urgent/Emergent Care
- Facilitate Immediate Care for Recent Adopters
- Training/Education of Veterinarians and Certified Veterinary Technicians




## STATS Since Opening October 2022


- 9,000 Patient Visits
- \$360,000 in subsidized care provided
- 3700 Spay/Neuter Surgeries
- 300 Dental Procedures
- 1200 Urgent Surgeries
- 26 Certified Veterinary Technician Students Trained
- 39% Canine, 58% Feline, 3% Other Species
